
This program provides a meaningful way to contribute to the strength and sustainability of libraries and the dedicated professionals who serve their communities.

community-focused projects.


These efforts strengthen libraries as essential hubs for education, information, services, internet access, and vital programming, ensuring they remain strong, stable, and responsive to evolving community needs.

PROGRAM FOCUS




Facility Improvements	Capital improvements, such as ADA accessibility upgrades, heating and cooling center improvements, sustainable facility certification, improvements to library green spaces, and LED lighting conversions, create long-term enhancements to library buildings.
Outreach & Programming	The creation and ongoing support of community-driven programs focused on sustainability , including food security initiatives, garden projects, and educational programming.
Fundraising Efforts	Supporting initiatives that enable libraries to broaden their funding sources is essential for diversifying and strengthening long-term sustainability . (Added in 2025)

PROGRAM EVOLUTION

After conducting a survey of libraries in New England, the program began in 2022 via direct invite.

The program today is now open to all eligible libraries throughout New England.

Application success rate still remains at more than 50%.

PROGRAM REFINENTS

This grant program was tailored to small libraries that often **fall outside the parameters of grant opportunities** despite having significant need and purpose due to limited staff time and a lack of large-scale grant administrative infrastructure.

Over the course of each grant cycle, we refine the program's structure **to ensure our focus aligns** with the evolving needs of libraries.



PROGRAM REFINEMENTS: INCREASING ACCESSIBILITY & IMPACT

Flexible Funding Levels

• A range of grant amounts let libraries request what best suits their unique goals and capacity.

• Expanded Focus Areas

• Broader program scope supports a wide range of community needs.

No Matching Funds Required

• Libraries can apply without needing to secure additional funding.

Quick & Simple Application

Streamlined process takes less than 2 hours to complete,
 with all required information provided upfront.



PROGRAM REFINEMENTS: INCREASING ACCESSIBILITY & IMPACT

Minimal Reporting Burden

• Only practical, actionable data is requested.

• Full Funding Provided Upfront

 Libraries receive the full grant amount at the start and may use leftover funds for other urgent needs.

No Receipt Submission

 Less paperwork means more time for program delivery.

Expanded Outreach

 Targeted marketing efforts through trusted partner networks increase program visibility and participation.
















Funding Levels by State 2022-2024




Throughout New England, this grant funding helps rural libraries across multiple communities expand access to vital resources and services that meet local needs.

From digital literacy programs to broadband access and tailored educational support, these grant-funded projects strengthen libraries' capacity to serve people of all demographics.


Despite limited staffing and resources, rural libraries are making a regional impact—fostering connection, opportunity, and lifelong learning across towns and communities.

SELECTED STORIES OF IMPACT

From establishing supportive programs for patrons of all ages to making vital building upgrades that ensure long-term structural integrity, ARSL is proud to showcase how rural libraries are addressing their most critical facility and community needs.

At times, this was the only reason we had food in our fridge.

The Montague Public Library (MA) led a community partnership to fight food insecurity in Millers Falls (pop. 1,081) by stocking the library's food pantry, providing monthly grocery bags to families in need, and offering nutrition workshops.

The library received a grant of \$8,465 in 2024, and was able to run the program for six months.

Orwell Free Library (VT) launched the Orwell Food & Farm Fest to connect residents (pop. 1,239) with local farmers and celebrate the area's agricultural abundance. After the closure of the village's general store and feed store, these summer festivals became a vital source of community connection and support. In 2022, Orwell Free Library put their \$8,000 grant to work to host more than 800 visitors, funded by the program, which have made the town green more welcoming for all.



Our town felt gutted, but now patrons use our internet while sitting at our benches and access new programming on the town green. This is an important space that is open and free for everyone.





Before this grant, the building's limitations restrained the capability and capacity of the library to serve community needs.

The **Ipswich Public Library (MA)** utilized a \$14,000 grant to renovate the damp, unfinished basement that was unusable - adding a permanent floor and new windows - allowing more much-needed open space upstairs for programs and community activities.

This renovation not only alleviated immediate space shortages but also positioned the library to adapt and expand to support community growth. (pop.13,903).

The new carpeting has made the library safer, warmer (literally and metaphorically), and far more inviting, encouraging children to spend more time reading and patrons to linger longer.

Thanks to a \$15,000 grant, the remote **Walter T. A. Hansen Memorial Library (ME)** transformed its aging facility by replacing warped tiles with new carpet and refurbishing the wheelchair ramp.

Completed in late 2024, the project greatly improved accessibility, comfort, and safety for both patrons and staff, especially those with disabilities.

This project has not only enhanced the physical space but also strengthened the community's (pop. 1,513) connection to the library and helped secure increased local funding for 2025.



ARSL MEMBER ENGLAGEMENT

ARSL is grateful to our Grants, Awards & Scholarships Committee, who coordinates the selection of grant recipients with the help of dedicated volunteers—library workers from small and rural communities across the country.

This peer-led process offers a two-fold benefit:

- Applicants have their proposals reviewed by those who deeply understand the challenges and opportunities small libraries face.
- Reviewers bring lived experience and professional insight to ensure funding goes where it can make the biggest impact.

"As a scholarship winner, I felt this was a good way to be of service to ARSL and the experience has been fantastic. We see a range of librarians and libraries apply for opportunities that will **enrich their work or benefit their patrons**.

While most of us struggle with funding, sometimes a request makes me realize what is happening in other library communities, such as the library who just wanted to purchase a bottle-filling drinking fountain, as clean water is not readily available in their community. How do you respond to such an ask? You could say it's not a library need, but in this case it was very easy to help a library to help their city."


